Five Ways to Engage Your Gifted Solution: Child in Reading

- Start young encourage independent reading by asking questions about what they have read.
- 2. Have appropriate resources available.- this can be tricky as students grow older and crave challenging material. Don't assume a child is ready for "young adult" content. Common Sense Media is one source for book ratings and reviews.
- 3. **Provide different text types** Have a wide range of reading material available. Use your child's interests to promote reading. Take time to read non-fiction to benefit growth as a reader.
- 4. Advocate for your child's education in reading - ask about the types of books and materials your child is reading in school.
