


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Talent Development News

Fourth graders learned all about investing in the stock market and how world events effect market pricing. The students enjoyed the first round so much that we began a second round using real companies and real-time pricing. Students worked in groups to analyze stanzas of the poem *Paul Revere*'s Ride and had wonderful class discussions.

Fifth graders learned early Algebra with Hands-on Equations. They also participated in a Breakout EDU game using math skills and critical thinking. I was so proud of their teamwork. These students did a fabulous job of making their presentations interactive for the class.
